Bec's name here was George Bailey.

Alyce Hahn of New York took him and trained him to do all kinds of therapy. He is amazing. He does a lot of hospice care and the stories about him and the patients give me goosebumps. He lived - to do good...and really has the 'angel' qualities!

I hope Alyce writes a book about him someday.

### **Bec's Owner: Alyce Hahn Writes:**

I think therapy dogs are gifts given to us so that we can share them with people who are in need of the gentle, unconditional love of a dog. In my case, my first therapy Sheltie was a PDA pup, in severe congestive heart failure, whose owner couldn't bear the thought of losing her, so she underwent open heart surgery at 8 wks of age.

I met her at 10 weeks old, and knew she was the one for me, shaved back and all! Eile survived and is now 6 years old and is the Sunshine of my life.

Bec, as you've read above by Kathy, is my second 'gift'. He's what I call my 'spare parts dog' because he was not expected to live, was the runt of the litter, his eyes are not perfectly almond shaped, his ears are too big, and he's a midget male at 13 inches who had no descended testicles! But he is my Mighty Bec.

Destined for great things! He and Eile were, I believe, spared, so that they could share their infectious personalities with people who need it most!

When we visit the Palliative care unit at the hospital every week, I am aware that MY dog is the last dog that the patients will touch. I take that responsibility seriously. My job is to be chauffeur for my dogs- so that THEY can work their magic and give patients a little happiness before they leave us. It's such a simple gift, and yet, it means so much to the patients and families.

I am humbled and amazed at how our dogs touch hearts. We cross paths only once in our life with these patients; it's wonderful to leave a 'happy memory' with them.

Whether we are in palliative, cardiology, oncology, pediatrics or the psyche units, Bec is a welcome visitor to bring a smile, even if only for a few moments.

Also, I think it's important to acknowledge that there is a place for the dogs that aren't 'standard beauties'. If it weren't for their 'faults' that make them not show quality, we wouldn't be the lucky ones to have them in our lives, So, a breeder's loss is our gain!

And, it strikes me, that **show dogs do their thing for the good of the breed, while our guys do a different kind of good for the breed.** There's a place for them all!

If breeders hadn't bred wonderful temperament shelties, we wouldn't have therapy dogs.

In the US there are misguided movements to limit legitimate breeders. This anti-breeding legislation would be detrimental to all of us who have purebred dogs, be they show dogs or not!

Here are a few of Bec's stories:

## MIGHTY BEC

### Three Months Of Age:

I left Bec (whose name is Gaelic for 'little') with my best friend for a week. The first night he was there, she awoke to him barking in his crate around 2 am. She knew that he usually didn't require a potty break in the middle of the night, but she figured that since he was in unfamiliar surroundings, she'd take him out. She went out into the back yard with him and noticed an orange glow reflecting off her house. The house next door was on fire! Bec had alerted her! She woke up the family in the house and called the firemen. She would have never smelled the smoke nor seen the fire had he not alerted her. He was her hero that night!

### Bec's First Hospital Visit:

Bec became a therapy dog a day after his first birthday. His FIRST EVER patient was a comatose 80 year old woman in the palliative unit.

I explained to the family that IF they wanted, Bec could lie beside their Mom and they could take their Mom's hand to 'pet' Bec so that she could feel his presence (just because they can't communicate doesn't mean that patients don't hear and feel). The family was thrilled that Bec could actually get in bed with her. So I picked Bec up, said a prayer that he would not behave like a one year old pup, but would give this woman's family a proper visit.

And then I watched as Bec nestled right beside the woman, rested his head on her chest and stayed that way as the woman's hand was moved by her family to 'pet' him. He had never visited a patient before; much less a comatose one, but he KNEW exactly what to do.

I was amazed and humbled to see my dog doing what he was born to do. I never taught him that; he just KNEW.

**More Visits:**

Bec met a 2 year old boy who was barely 1.5 foot tall. I held the leash but gave the boy the end so he 'thought' he was walking Bec. This boy had been bed bound for four days so he was busting to run. So he took off running with the leash, waving it over his head, and squealing the whole way! Bec was more than willing to run along (since when he's working at the hospital, this usually never happens!)

**We Were Asked To Visit With An 11 Month Old, Mentally And Physically Challenged Little Girl:**

The physical therapist took one look at Bec and said "we'll use him as bait". I knew exactly what she meant. The girl was placed on a mat, sitting up, and Bec would be used to entice her to crawl over to him, and then to pet him (improving her motor skills). Now Bec had never seen a child so small, down on his level before. So, he did what he does best- introduce himself by getting right up next to her and touched her face with his nose. She squealed with delight. Then he backed up a couple steps away from her, and she followed. Once she reached her goal, they moved her arms and hands to show her how to pet Bec, and then watched as she repeated the motion, and petted him.

The power of a dog and child interacting.

**The Whole Room Was Watching:**

The elevator at the hospital was crowded with people, Bec was in my arms, looking around, working the crowd. The doors opened on the palliative unit, and a woman was sitting on the bench there. She bounded over to the elevator and shouted "Pet therapy is here!". She had been waiting for us and was over the moon excited. The people in the elevator said as we left: "Wow! What a way to be greeted!"

The Woman told me our visit would mean so much to her Dad because he loved dogs and grew up with Collies. I visited her Dad and roomful of about 10 relatives holding vigil. He was comatose and near death. His Doctor was there- she is one of the regulars up there and very caring and very supportive of the value of pet therapy. I asked if she wanted me to come back after she'd finished and she said "You two can do more for him than I can". How caring. So, Mr Bec was put in bed next to the Dad, and bless him, Bec was perfect. He lay down and snuggled next to the man's side. I could feel everyone watching him, so those are the moments when you hope the dog is sensitive and in tune with what you are asking. His daughter put her Dad's arm on Bec's paws and Bec put his head down to rest on his arm, and give a few welcomed kisses. I heard sniffles and the box of Kleenex being passed around and knew there wasn't a dry eye in the room, and that I couldn't look around or I'd lose it. The Doctor was standing in the corner just watching and smiling.

On to Killarney and the judge Mr S Watson gave Green Star Dog and BOB to Castillos Multi Ch Navarrem the Conqueror and Green Star Bitch to Doyles Ch Sevenoaks Angels Whisper.



The next show was Limerick and the judge was Peter Farrell who gave Green Star Bitch and BOB to Cathrina Dunnes Ch Fearnach Frosty Moon at Longrange jun ch, cw11, cjw11, and the Dog Green Star winner was Doyles Ch Sevenoaks Gold Illusion. The bitch also went group 1 under breed specialist Mr J R Walsh.

## **Information before going to press:**

Monty was lost on August 26<sup>th</sup> 2012 on Milmont Dr, Milpitas, CA.

There have been two unconfirmed sightings-three weeks ago. (Unconfirmed because there is another fluffy dog lost in the same area).

Monty is not at any of the 6 shelters within 35 miles of the owner. No one has claimed they have him.

Petamberalert issued but no leads. Posters, flyers, craigslist, facebook, twitter, newspapers, etc have led to no leads. Animal communicator has this to say: He is still alive and on the loose; he goes to a big and a small park and uses the parks to get to strip malls/restaurants to find food; he dug himself a hole somewhere and sometimes sleeps there; sometimes sleeps under cars; he does not go out everyday. One time some people threw bread at him.

The owners have been searching by car, on foot and by bike but have not seen him themselves.

The owners hope he is still in the area and that someone spots him soon and will contact them or animal control. He is very shy and best way to catch him is to probably lure him with food into someone's backyard because animal shelter said city would not allow them to put a trap in a property they do not own. If we had a current sighting, we plan to plead with someone in that area to lend us their backyard to put a trap in.







# JUDGING IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC

APRIL 2012



I felt extremely honoured and privileged to be invited by the committee of the Cesky Klub Chovalelu Sheltii, o.s. to judge their Club show in Hradec Kralove in April this year. Not only was I looking forward to seeing the Shelties in the Czech Republic, it also meant that I would have the opportunity to visit your country and explore the beautiful city of Prague and its magnificent historical buildings. I was also well aware of just how fortunate I was to have been given this opportunity and the responsibility and debt of gratitude I owed to the Club and its members who were prepared to place their trust in me and accept my decisions on the quality of their Shelties.

Having accepted the invitation to judge your show, I was also asked if I would be prepared to give a presentation on the Illustration of the Breed Standard and, despite my reservations, I agreed to do this in the hope that it would help us all to gain a little more knowledge about our lovely breed and to recognise and appreciate the correct Sheltie type according to the UK standard as we discussed the various points in more detail.

Due to commitments at home, my visit had to be kept relatively short and I arrived at Prague airport on Friday evening before being driven to the home of Katerina Pankova and Lukas Krincjav who cared for me and looked after me so well throughout the whole of my visit, not an easy task for anyone. The following morning we were blessed with glorious weather and, having enjoyed a lovely breakfast, Lukas took me into the city of Prague where I had a very enjoyable and interesting day visiting Prague Castle and the magnificent Cathedral of St Vitus, as well as the various historic buildings and places of interest. I even got the opportunity to sample some of the local delicacies! The time passed by so quickly

and soon it was time for us to return home and prepare for the journey to Hradec Kralove in readiness for the show the following day.

Sadly, the weather turned wet that evening and it continued to rain into the following morning which meant that the committee were faced with the difficult task of having to rearrange their plans and prepare an area under cover so that judging could take place in more pleasant conditions. Although it wasn't ideal as we were a little bit limited for space, particularly when it came to moving the dogs, it served its purpose and exhibitors seemed happy with the alternative arrangements. Typically, as soon as judging commenced, the rain stopped, the sun came out and it was dry and very pleasant for the remainder of the day!

As the method of judging is a little different from the United Kingdom, I was not familiar with the grading system and I dare say some of my decisions may have seemed a little harsh. If this is the case, then I hope you will understand when I say that I firmly believe that a Sheltie should be as near as possible to the ideal and very typical of the breed to receive an excellent grade. I accept that no dog is perfect and they all have their faults, but his virtues should far outweigh his imperfections and he should be as close to the breed standard as possible. With this in mind I feel sure you will also appreciate that those who were graded very good possessed many virtues and were good representatives of the breed but were not quite up to the standard required. With baby puppies, it can be difficult to evaluate them as they are still developing and going through the 'leggy' stage, but it is possible to recognise whether or not they possess that early promise. Although there was only one puppy dog entered in the Baby Puppy class, he showed potential and was graded very promising. However, I was a little disappointed with the quality of the puppy dogs and could only justify grading them as promising.

Unfortunately, I'm working from memory and don't have my critiques to refer to, so cannot comment, and do not feel it is fair to comment, on any one dog, but what I did find in some of the classes was untypical heads, with little or no stop. Also noticeable was the broad deep skull and stronger head, rather than the lean blunt wedge which the standard calls for. These broader, deep skulls can spoil the expression as they tend to be accompanied with a rounder, more forward facing eye and not the desired, almond shaped, obliquely set eye which gives that sweet, melting expression. A Sheltie should be refined and elegant, not coarse and cloddy as was noticeable in some of the later bitch classes where a few were bigger than ideal and lacked that required elegance and femininity. I do feel that size, particularly in the bitches, is something to concentrate on in the future. There were a few who were very apprehensive on the table which made it quite difficult for me to assess them and I had to take this into account when making my decisions.

One of the nicest classes of the day was the Puppy Bitch class, with some very promising puppies entered, and it was quite difficult to choose between them, which is very encouraging for the future. The best puppy winner, Vignette z Dablový Studanky, owned by Iveta Novotná and bred by Mlada Svobodova, is just six months old and what a delightful baby she is. She has the most appealing expression, enhanced by her lovely white blaze, and possesses the correct wedge shaped head, lovely ear carriage and the darkest, most expressive eyes. She is very well constructed and I feel sure that she has a bright future ahead of her.

Dee started attending Gippsland Obedience Dog Club from the age of 4 months old. We started training and it took time, but we achieved our first title of **Community Companion Dog – ‘CCD’ in April 2007**. We continued on trialling and gained our next title in obedience of **Companion Dog – ‘CD’ in July 2007**. Training continued on to Companion Dog Excellent which entailed out of sight sit/stays, but after a few trials Dee discovered this was not her forte as she didn't like being left alone in the ring. Dee accompanies me to our local obedience club every Saturday morning and she enjoys assisting me with showing the ‘newies’ some of the basic obedience commands.

In the meantime, Dee had been training in tracking and thoroughly enjoyed this. She gained her first title of **Tracking Dog – ‘TD’ in July 2006**, then continued on and gained her **Tracking Dog Excellent – ‘TDX’ title in October 2007**. She went on to gain her **Tracking Champion title in 2008**. Obedience, as you may have noticed, had gone by the wayside as Dee just did not enjoy doing it any more.

Then a few years later, the new discipline of Tracking Search Dog was introduced. This is a little different to basic tracking, but we decided to give Dee a go at it and found her love of tracking was still there, even though Dee was about 9 & a half years old by this stage. She still managed to gain her first title of **Tracking Search Dog in July 2012**. She has already gained her next track towards the next title of Tracking Search Dog Excellent. Tracking is only done in a certain season of the year (i.e. in Winter).

# Exocrine Pancreatic Insufficiency

New study

## Exocrine Pancreatic Insufficiency

The pancreas produces enzymes used to digest food. When the amount of digestive enzymes is insufficient, the condition is called exocrine pancreatic insufficiency (EPI). The condition occurs in many breeds of dogs and in cats. Dogs with EPI tend to lose weight even though they have ravenous appetites. The faeces tend to be pale, voluminous, loose, and malodorous. The most common cause of EPI is pancreatic atrophy, which is wasting or decreased size of the organ. It may have an underlying genetic cause in many dogs, but may also be caused by repeated bouts of pancreatitis. There is no cure for the condition, but it can be managed with lifelong enzyme supplements.

Drs. Leigh Anne Clark and Kate Tsai of Clemson Canine Genetics, Clemson University, <http://www.clemsoncaninegenetics.com/> have found genes of interest concerning EPI that they would like to sequence in dogs. They are interested in receiving DNA samples from at least 12 different breeds of dogs, including Shetland Sheepdogs. Dogs must be pure-bred, but actual pedigrees are not required.

What is required for the study:

Cheek swab DNA samples from affected Shelties and a signed informed consent form. If possible, a copy of the TLI (Trypsin-Like Immunoreactivity) test result should be included.

Q. When did you register the Pepperhill affix, and is there a special meaning behind the name?

A. The Pepperhill affix was already owned by Maureen Daniels, and when we joined forces in 1980 we registered it in our joint names. It is a combination of Pepper (From the road we lived on at the time) and Hill (From the surrounding hills)

Q. Please tell us about your first home bred litter.

A. Oh gosh. My first home bred litter was from my first sheltie. Bought as a pet (Incidentally a sable and white with blue eyes) I had absolutely no idea what to expect. Made no preparation, went off to work in the morning totally unaware that anything was imminent. I came home to a lovely litter of 4 puppies, born in the bitches usual wicker basket... surrounded by her stash of carrots, potatoes, toys etc.

Q. There must be some interesting or funny stories to tell about breeding, or your stud dogs?

A. The time someone phoned and asked if they could bring their pet bitch to be mated. They asked if it was ok to bring the children. I said "Yes, as long as you explain to the children what is happening !!!"

Q. There must be many a funny incident you could share with us from the past?

A. As a part time job to augment my income, I used to be responsible for the catering at Nottingham County Football Club (for the supporters) on match days. At this time I had a very outgoing tricolour dog, Tizer, who always came along to the ground. This particular Saturday, I could hear a lot of bellowing and shouting. I came out of the kitchen to find Tizer had produced a huge parcel in front of the goal mouth right on the penalty spot!!! I, rather red facedly had to dash across with a shovel and remove the offending parcel.

Q. We all have a special dog that pulls at our heartstrings forever. Which was yours and why?

A. Champion Pepperhill Naughty but Nice, (Busby) he was such a gentleman, he seemed to know exactly what frame of mind you were in. He was such a fantastic little stud dog, never let us down.

He had quite an illustrious show career, very rarely was he out of the cards. He stood in so many challenges for the CC that we lost count. I began to despair that he would EVER get that BIG one, until at the SSCNW championship show under Derek Rigby, at 7 years of age, he won Open Dog, Veteran Dog, and at last, his first CC. His second two followed very quickly.

Q. You have bred some lovely dogs, which are you most proud of?

A. I am proud of all of them, obviously as I said in the last question, Busby. Also Champion Pepperhill Blue Fizz, who was proudly owned and shown by Linda Sorockyj, he held the breed record for the number of CC's won for quite a while.
